In *Being Somebody and Black Besides*, George B. Inspired by a film, an opera, and a ballet, Bocanegra, whose work involves large-scale installation and performance, draws on the breadth of her experience to create multidisciplinary works of art. Blending elements from performing and visual arts-textile, collage, performance, staging, video, and music-she blurs the boundary between the black box of the theater and the white box of the museum. The work featured in this book was created for an exhibition at the Fabric Workshop and Museum, Philadelphia, on view from October 2018 to February 2019. *Valley* is an immersive video experience in which Bocanegra has recreated Judy Garland's original wardrobe test for the 1967 film *Valley of the Dolls*-the actress was fired from the film but memorably kept the clothing from the screen test. Eight notable women each wear replicas of the wardrobe in *Valley*: poet Anne Carson, choreographer and dancer Deborah Hay, artist Joan Jonas, singer Alicia Hall Moran, author and actor Tanya Selvaratnam, actor Kate Valk, artist Carrie Mae Weems, and ballerina Wendy Whelan. Bocanegra's new work *Dialogue of the Carmelites* was inspired by Francis Poulenc's 1956 opera, based on the true story of a French convent of nuns who were executed in the waning days of the French Revolution by anticlerical Revolutionary forces. It incorporates a new piece of music by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer David Lang performed by Pulitzer Prize-winning composer and singer Caroline Shaw. In *La Fille*, Bocanegra uses theatrical

sets, costumes, and collage to capture the essence of the eighteenth-century ballet *La Fille mal Gardée* (The Poorly Guarded Girl), a comic portrayal of young love between two peasants that was considered radical at the time. It's impossible to play possum. While we're in the soft embrace of light, the NSA and Facebook are still collecting our data, the money in our bank accounts is still being used to fund who-knows-what without our knowledge or consent, the government we elected is still imprisoning and targeting people with whom we have no beef. We deserve an art that is the equal of our information age. Not one that parrots the age's self-assertions or modes of dissemination, but an art that is hyper-aware, vigilant, active, engaged, and informed. We are now one hundred years clear of Duchamp's first readymades. So why should we find ourselves so thoroughly in thrall to ambience? *Against Ambience* argues for an art that acknowledges its own methods and intentions; its own position in the structures of cultural power and persuasion. Rather than the warm glow of light or the soothing wash of sound, *Against Ambience* proposes an art that cracks the surface of our prevailing patterns of encounter, initiating productive disruptions and deconstructions.

The book is an ethnographic study of the identity, role, formation, and practices of the organic intellectuals that populate and propagate this 'conscious' hip hop milieu. Turner provides an insightful examination of the work of artists and practitioners who use hip hop 'off-street' in the spheres of youth work, education, and theatre to raise consciousness and to develop artistic and personal skills. *Hip Hop Versus Rap* seeks to portray how cultural activism, which styles itself grassroots and mature, is framed around a discursive opposition between what is authentic and ethical in hip hop culture and what is counterfeit and corrupt. Turner identifies that this play of difference, framed as an ethical schism, also presents hip hop's organic intellectuals with a narrative that enables them to align their insurgent values with those of policy and to thereby receive

institutional support. This enlightening volume will be of interest to post-graduates and scholars interested in hip hop studies; youth work; critical pedagogy; young people and crime/justice; the politics of race/racism; the politics of youth/education; urban governance; social movement studies; street culture studies; and vernacular studies.

Around the world, the champions of this form of expression are numerous, ranging from art historians such as Grant Kester, curators such as Nicolas Bourriaud and Nato Thompson, to performance theorists such as Shannon Jackson. *Artificial Hells* is the first historical and theoretical overview of socially engaged participatory art, known in the US as social practice. Claire Bishop follows the trajectory of twentieth-century art and examines key moments in the development of a participatory aesthetic. This itinerary takes in Futurism and Dada; the Situationist International; Happenings in Eastern Europe, Argentina and Paris; the 1970s Community Arts Movement; and the Artists Placement Group.
